BLAIR Windsor set a course record, but it was emerging talent Harrison Carter who took out one of the major events on the Bathurst Cycling Club calender on the weekend - the Jack McKay Memorial.

McKay, who died in 1997, was one of Bathurst's most popular cycling identities and helped promote his chosen sport through his role at the National Advocate and Western Advocate newspapers.

Under the name of 'the pedler' he spent over 50 years in the local newspaper industry and along with friend Jack Gunning, was responsible for the publicity that has provided the foundation for the club's modern

The Jack McKay Memorial event is contested on a demanding 55 kilometre course that includes the infamous Caloola Hill before finishing at St Johns Road at Georges Plains.

It uses a handicap format, which was the favoured format for McKay when he was a competitor, with riders of all levels having a chance to win.

With some riders getting almost 40 minutes start from the two scratch markers contact riders Blair Windsor (Budget Forklifts) and Tim Guy (Team Ride Sport) the pace was on right from the start.

Wheeler was also responsible for a strong ride in second place.

The big chasing bunch then fought it out for the minor placings with sprinter Drew Carter showing his speed to take third in front of Windsor, Peter Cady and Watson.

Windsor's finishing time of 1: 20.01 was a new course record and indicated both the quality of the chase from himself and Guy, plus the input of Watson and Martin.

He started the Bathurst leg of his walk from Bathurst Public School where he was joined by students and Cr Hanger.


The send-off yesterday was one of five mini-events hosted by pri-mary school students that Mullan will visit along the way.





#### The heater's on, but leave those windows open

# By JACINTA CARROLL of toxic omissions including carbon

WINTER is coming, and with it freezing conditions.

But students at Kelso High can expect to have the external windows and classroom door open, no matter how cold it is.

That's the advice the Department of Education has issued to prevent students inhaling dangerous levels monoxide, nitrous oxide and formaldehyde from the school's unflued gas heaters.

The heaters are in the spotlight after it was revealed vesterday that public students across the state are being exposed to dangerous gas levels above World Health Organisation standards.

#### **Heater policy too cool for schools**

Noel Creenaune, Bathurst organiser for the NSW Teachers Federation said the risks posed by heaters were nothing new.

In fact, local union members had been part of a long running campaign for substitute classroom heating.

"Last year, a teacher at Kelso High School had to be hospitalised after passing out in the classroom," he said, adding that the union had rallied to get alternative heating in Kelso High School's new campus before building began.

Teachers Federation member Rob

Bartulovich confirmed the teacher was hospitalised last year.

"Yes, one staff member was hospitalised and we were told the reason was the results of carbon monoxide in the air from the heaters," he said.

"The heaters are low nox [noxious], but still unflued, so they insist at least one window and a door be open to allow for cross-ventilation.

"This is just a ludicrous situation given the depths of our winter."

Mr Bartulovich said the union has raised the issue on a number of occasions, but feels the government is burying its head in the sand.

"I give an open invitation to [Education Minister] Verity Firth to come and sit in the classroom for an hour in the middle of winter with the door and window open, to see if she still thinks its a good idea," he said.

A department spokesperson yesterday

"We've already put in a long hard fight [to have things changed] but it seems it's provide effective and efficient heating in


"The majority of people who have gas heating in their homes will have unflued gas heaters," the spokesperson said. "When used in accordance with instructions these heaters are safe, efficient and

The spokesperson said the department had commissioned the Woolcock Institute for Medical Research to undertake a study into low emission unflued gas heaters in schools.

"Monitoring will occur over the winter months of 2009 and 20 schools will be randomly selected by the Woolcock Institute to be included in the study."

The study will make recommendations to the department and the details of the study will be released publicly.



"For the kids this is probably the first time their ever done something like this so seeing what they have created is



TWO of Bathurst's brightest and indeed most inspiring athletes have achieved selection to what shapes as the biggest competition of their lives.

Rachel Staines and Emilie Miller will both compete at the inaugural Australian Paralympic Youth Games in Melbourne in October after being informed of their selection earlier this month.

Staines, who was born with cerebral palsy which affects her ability to move the right side of her body, and Miller, who suffers paralysis as a result of a training mishap in Lithgow, have both done enough in terms of qualifying times to get a start at the extravaganza which kicks off on Monday, October 5.

The Games will consist of seven different sports – swimming, athletics, wheelchair basketball, seven-a-side football, hand-cycling tennis and table tennis. The parents of both young stars say it will be both a highlight and hopefully a stepping stone to something bigger.

"She is over the moon, she can't wait," Allan Staines said of his talented daughter, who has recently set 100 and 200 metre breaststroke short course records in her S-7 classification.

"This will be a big highlight of her career, she has worked hard for it and it is the next step towards her being noticed by the Paralympic coaches and her goal to compete in London in 2012."

Staines has qualified for virtually every event imaginable, beginning with the 50m races for all strokes, going up into the 100m breaststroke and freestyle, the 200m individual medley and the 400m freestyle.

On top of the competition itself, one of her main challenges will be simply deciding which events to contest and which to leave out, a decision she will make with her father – who also looks after some of her coaching – and her main coach Rhonda Hausfeld.

The news of her selection comes on the back of some other big news in her career.

"She has also been selected to swim by NSW Swimming with the state individual medley squad," Allan Staines explained.

"They are taking part in three training days – she has been to one while the others are coming up – she is one of only four multi-disability swimmers to be picked for that squad."

Meanwhile, Miller's qualification for the Melbourne Games means that another box gets ticked as she too aims at one day competing at the Paralympics.

Proud mum Donna Miller says her daughter is already stepping up her preparations in anticipation of the event.

"She has been doing a lot of work in the Health World gym, three or four sessions a week doing weights and things like that as well as her pool sessions, she loves that environment with the footy boys and geeing them up," Donna Miller said.

"Emilie is really looking forward to this whole experience – the actual experience of just being a part of it will be huge but the results themselves are just as important to her. If she goes down there and doesn't swim her quickest times – look out! I'm not going to be driving her home!"


Miller's times have dropped dramatically in the handful of meets where she has swum in the time since her accident, specialising in the 50m backstroke.

Getting this sort of recognition for her efforts so far will doubtless be a massive motivator for her to continue her improvement.

"She is very excited, this is a great chance for her to meet other people in the same situation with the same attitude, they get the full gear and they get to watch all the other sports as well," Donna Miller explained.

"She is going to use it as an opportunity to meet some other kids, to swim some good times and also to get the attention of the Paralympic selectors.


