

Operated by mother and son duo, Vanessa and Josh Shearman, the service will collect your mail from the post office boxes at Bathurst Post Office and deliver it directly to your business.

What sets this business apart is the amazing social value it is adding to Josh's life.

Having finished Year 12 last year at Kelso High and suffering from noncommunicative autism, Josh and his mum established the business earlier this month to begin the next stage in the young man's life.

"Josh loves travelling in cars and we were looking for something to keep him busy and offer him a challenge," Vanessa explained,

"So we started JLS Mail Service."

Bathurst City Life caught up with Josh (pictured) and Vanessa before a delivery run late last week from the Bathurst Post Office.

"Essentially, we collect the company's or individual's mail from their PO Box and deliver it for just \$8," Vanessa said.

"We can also collect people's mail when we make a delivery and take it back to the post office for them for

Vanessa said the emerging business already had a handful of local businesses using the service.

"Also, we drop into the Oak Tree retirement complex once a week and collect everyone's mail to post it for them. Merridy and the residents are great supporters of ours," she beamed.



ALTHOUGH Western NSW Mariners FC moves into a brave new world after earning promotion to this year's women's Football NSW National Premier League 2, the outfit does have the benefit of opening its 2018 campaign against familiar faces.

The Mariners face University of NSW in Sunday's season opener, a side which was also granted promotion and, coincidentally, the same outfit that knocked Western NSW out of last year's State League race by handing it a 2-0 defeat in the final round.

"Quite a few sides from State League have come up so we're not (heading in blind), but who knows, UNSW might have a whole bunch of new players too and we're going to find out about every side the first time we play them," Western star Jasmin Courtenay, also a former Newcastle Jet, said.

"We'd like to get a win over them after they knocked us out last season."

Well aware of the challenges promotion to NPL2 will bring, Courtenay says her side's end goal won't change too much.

"Our mindset stays the same in terms of going as far as we can," Courtenay said.

"I definitely think we can give all the teams in this competition a really good run for their money, at the very least."

WAITING SCHOOL STUDENTS NEED BETTER PROTECTION

THE lack of shelter at the Kelso Bus Exchange makes Kelso High Campus the laughing stock of the many thousands of students from across all schools who use the exchange each and every day.

As a Year 11 student of Kelso High, I've seen how harsh the natural elements can be on the students who are waiting for their afternoon bus to arrive.

Our bus bay serves all schools across Bathurst, and you'd imagine we would have a shelter to accommodate such importance. Well, we don't. Sort of.

We do technically have a shelter. Two, in fact - two very small ones that look as if they belong in a display at Cockington Green.

Anyone who has driven past will under-

They are both visually and physically small. At maximum capacity, maybe 15 reasonably thin kids could fit.

On Monday, March 5, 2018, Bathurst experienced a huge deluge of rain, unleashing havoc on my fellow peers.

For a lot of kids, some buses don't come around until 4.30pm, and waiting one hour in an intense downpour proved too much.

I was a lucky one; my bus arrived right on 4pm. Thirty minutes standing in the rain managed to completely destroy my Year 11 school notes and partially damage my laptop. And my bag was waterproof!

Some kids whose bags weren't waterproof went home with not just destroyed books and technology, but also completely destroyed bags.

It wasn't always like this, though.

In the 2016/2017 summer holidays, the original (much bigger) bus shelter was demolished to make way for an improved bus exchange. Complementing the upgrade were two new smaller shelters mentioned

It was the result of years of pushing and negotiation by our school to receive funding for these essential safety upgrades.

And as a student, I thoroughly commend our school, council and Roads and Maritime Services for adopting these changes, as the bus exchange is much safer for (especially) young school children.

But after experiencing the scorching summer's heat and Monday's downpour. students, parents and myself are furious and demand why greater action hasn't been taken by all parties to address the problem.

Our school pushed for the upgrades, surely they can push for a new, much larger shelter.

Courtenay has faith in winless Mariners

THE Western NSW Mariners FC are still hunting for their first points of the National Premier Leagues 2 season, but striker Jasmin Courtenay is confident they will come soon.

Promoted to the NPL 2 competition this year, the Mariners know they must lift their standard in order to be competitive.

In week one the Mariners went down 1-0 to another promoted club in University of NSW, while on Sunday in Lithgow, the Western outfit went down 2-1 to Gladesville Ravens.

Gladesville is currently in its second season at NPL2 level.

Courtenay feels her Mariners were unlucky not to win in both those games and knows more match time will see her team-mates improve. She thinks they can be competitive in the new league.

"I think both games have been even, they could have been anyone's for the taking. On both occasions it has been the other team that has taken it, so we've got some things to work on," she said.

"We only had three trial games, so we are still trying to figure out how each new person is playing, figuring out our patterns. But we can see some progress with what we have been working on at training, so that's good.

"Hopefully this weekend we can pick things up and get some points on the board."

Hosting the Ravens at Majorie Jackson Field, Courtenay gave her side the lead in the first half when she converted from

The Mariners were awarded the penalty after Teegan Courtney was fouled in the box and Courtenay's shot sailed into the top right corner of the net.

By half-time the Ravens were back on level terms after Annalise Schiraldi netted, with her team-mate Kirrily Moore then making it 2-1 after the break,

But as has been typical of Mariners performances in recent seasons, they lifted and continued to push for an equaliser until the final whistle.

They managed to create chances, but were unable to provide the final touches which would have given them their first points of

"We should've won," Courtenay said. "We were still carrying a few injuries, but things just didn't come off for us. We had

"We nearly got a goal to make it 2-all right at the end. Credit to the girls, they put in a lot of effort, we just needed that extra bit that we didn't have left.

"I had a few late chances, Teegan had a few late ones as well - all of our strikers had chances, but they didn't quite make them in.

"Finishing touches we need to work on, but their two centre backs were really strong and it was hard to get around them. We just need to work on getting support up the front and more girls in the box when the ball is coming so we have more bodies there

Both Courtney and Courtenay, as well as goalkeeper Jess Daymond, have previously played at NPL 1 level and as the season unfolds, their experience will no doubt help the younger members of the Mariners squad develop.

"I think any of the older girls have leadership responsibilities ... but I think a lot of them do look to me for an example, me and Teegan. We are the voices on the pitch and that's where you expect it to come from," Courtenay said. "I just would rather lead by example with what I do on the pitch."



Youth homelessness has become a significant issue in Australia in recent times, with 28,000 people aged 12-25 homeless every night, a number which has risen 92 per cent since 2001.

From a local standpoint, Bathurst's Veritas House assists more than 150 young people each year, housing up to 6 people a night and offering five medium-term properties for young people to live

Last week's collaboration was supported by **Bathurst Regional Council and the Bathurst** Youth Council, and was a positive community event raising much needed awareness for disadvantaged youth.

ABBEY-MAY Brown has become Bathurst's latest national champion courtesy of a stunning personal best performance at the Georgina Hope Foundation Australian Age Swimming Championships.

Brown, 16, knocked over a minute off her seed time on her way to winning the 200 metres freestyle S1-S5 multi-class in four minutes and 10.57 seconds.

The year 11 Kelso High School student could hardly believe what she was seeing when the time at Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre came up on the screen.

"My qualifying time was a 5:13 for the race, but I've PB'd in this unofficially with a 4:21. I swam a 4:10 but during the race I felt like I'd been swimming really, really slow,"

"I looked up at the clock and I couldn't believe it. It was so good."

Brown got off to a flying start in her race at Homebush with an opening lap of 56.58.

She was just outside the minute mark, but consistent with her times, across the

The opening lap shows that the next big hurdle - the four minute barrier - is definitely within her reach in the near future.

Brown's time is the eighth fastest in the world recorded for the 200m in her classifi-

Brown, who has cerebral palsy, is currently the only S5 swimmer in her age group across Australia.

A chance to take on the rest of the world is her ultimate goal.

The Bathurst City Amateur Swim Club member has made a rapid rise up the time sheets over her short swimming career.

In the space of less than three years she has advanced far enough to even put the

Paralympics on her radar.

With the effort that Brown is putting into her training it's a dream that is undoubtedly within her reach.

"I've only been swimming for two and a half years. I was told by someone that it normally takes four years to qualify for this meet that I just went to," she said.

"At big meets like this the Paralympians talk to young people about their goals and achievements. If they come and seek you out then it's a pretty big deal.

"They said 'You can definitely try and qualify for Tokyo.' I can only swim freestyle and backstroke but they want me to try and swim all four strokes because that gives me more opportunities."

That discussion at the championships has inspired Brown to increase her workload in

"I normally try and swim five sessions a week ... but since I've heard that I've been trying to swim around eight sessions a week," she said.

Young Mariners in charge in a big win

A HOST of fresh faces drove the Western NSW Mariners to an electric 3-1 victory over Gladesville Ravens FC on Sunday in their National Premier League 2 (NPL2) competition match.
