The night began with a group performance by all Year 11 Drama student:



From the Deputy's Desk


This year we have seen the introduction of a set of statements called "Expectations".

It is a list of the standards that every student should be trying hard to reach and show on all occasions. It is a list of what teachers, parents and students would expect from students in the school classrooms, corridors and playground.

The "Expectations" cover three main areas:

- A positive application and commitment to the school and to class work.
- Meeting standards of bookwork, homework, uniform and attendance.
 - Co-operative and appropriate conduct.

It is well known that if expectations and standards are clearly stated and followed by people, there is usually much greater understanding of ways that people can be expected to be treated by others. If the expectations are not clearly known then people do not have standards to aim for. These goals are important in the life of students during and after their time at school.



At Kelso High School the "Expectations" go hand-in-hand with the "Code of Behaviour". If students meet standards and expectations they will be included in a number of extra events during the year. This year students who have not met these expectations have not been invited to activities such as the Picton visit or school discos.

This year, the Principal and myself have visited a large number of classes and have been very pleased with the high levels of work, effort and the commitment of the students. Some students have been required to resubmit work, but most have met the required standards.

Next year, we again will review the standards and distribute a new set of 'Expectations'. We hope also to be able to increase the rewards to students who show consistently high achievement of these "Expectations".


Our Rock Eisteddfod this year was successful in being selected for the state finals at the Entertainment Centre. Their performance was outstanding on the night and they were awarded the prize for choreography. This was especially deserving because the choreography was done by our students.

Our Drama students also received recognition with winning performances in the Regional Shakespeare Competition in the Duo and Dance/Movement sections. This culminated in competing in the State Finals at the Seymour Centre.

Our Tournament of Minds team again were successful in winning their Regional section and competing in the State Final.

Our success in environmental projects continued this year with a major award through the Tidy Towns Competition and winning the State Envirothon Award.

Other notable programs this year which enriched our school were the conducting of the inaugural Primary Schools in Parliament at Kelso High School which was coordinated by Mr Browning. The video conferences



with students from Wales as part of the Montage Project was another activity which involved our students this year.

In the curriculum area our senior students were able to broaden their educational program through the launch of the Edulink program which enables students to access school and TAFE courses for the HSC. While this program is across schools, it was Kelso High School which has taken a leading role in the development of this program.

As we look back on this year we should be proud of our many successes and the opportunities taken by our students.

Next year we see the commencement of the new HSC with some changes to course and the way courses are assessed. One of the real advantages of the new HSC is that students will receive the results their work deserves and being matched against set standards. In the present system the results match a state-wide pattern with the final mark reflecting a rank rather than what students can do. This is one of the advantages of the new HSC and it is something we should look forward to.



OPEN BOY'S HOCKEY

The boys hockey team enjoyed its most successful season since the school opened. Never before has this team reached the final of the State wide Knockout Competition. To be the second best school team: beaten 7-3 in the final by the other Western team, Lithgow - is a fantastic achievement, one that the boys will remember forever.

The season began in April with the divisional day in Orange. There we had convincing wins over Borowa and Canobolas. The Western finals, again in Orange, were held early in Term 2 with Kelso winning their semifinal against Orange by a lot goals to not many. Kelso secured a finals place and the chance to progress to the State Finals series. Both finalists from Western move into the Regional Knockouts. Lithgow played brilliant hockey to defeat Kelso 12-5 in the Final.

Kelso's next game was in Bathurst against the winning South Coast team, Crookwell. This proved to be a relatively easy win for the Kelso boys. They returned to school 5-0 victors.

So it was off to Wollongong on Monday 13th September to the State Final. The quarter final game was at 8.00 on Tuesday 14th against Corowa, 1998 State runners up. An early goal to Corowa was the spur that the Kelso boys needed to lift their game - they ran out 3-1 winners. Much of this game was played with Captain

Brent Naylor sidelined with a middle ear infection. Can you imagine Brent taking himself off not once, but twice! He really was sick.

The afternoon semi-final proved to be an epic struggle against the 1998 Champions, Grafton High. In 1998 they beat us in the semi-final at Newcastle, so the boys were fired up for revenge. And so it proved to be. Kelso controlled the game so well in the centre, winning 5-2. This day was their finest beating both the 1998 finalists most convincingly.

Unfortunately, they could not carry this form into Wednesday's final. Lithgow were totally dominant throughout the game, leading 4-0 at half time and running out State champions for the 4th time in 5 years, 7 goals to 2.

The Kelso team can be proud of their efforts in 1999, but will need to work very hard to go one better in 2000. Where are you from Taka? I'm from Yamagata, a town in northern Honshu, that's the main island of Japan. Yamagata is on the west coast. It is a city of about 3 million people. I live in the city. It is an industrial city. I live in a house, not an apartment. There are six people in my family. Me, my father and mother, my father's parents and an older sister.

What kind of things do you do in Yamagata? I like going to town with my friends and walking around. I like school. I like talking to my friends. I like Maths.

What is school like in Japan? I go to a private school. Yamamoto High School. It is a senior high school with students in Years 10 to 12 (15 to 18 years old). We usually go to school for six days per week, but the 2nd and 4th Saturday we get a holiday. School goes from 9am to 3pm. At school I study Japanese and World History, Maths, Japanese, Science, Philosophy, English and Physical Education. We have one month of summer holidays. I usually stay at home during my holidays.

How do you learn English in Japan? It is very simple and very formal. The same way you learn Japanese in Australia.

What is Japan like? It is a lot smaller in Japan. The cities have a lot of smog. Australian cities are cleaner.

What kind of food do you eat in Japan? Fish and chips, hamburgers. McDonalds.

How did you become an exchange student? I became one because I was a good English student. I wanted to go to the United States of America but I was too late and so I came to Australia.

What did you know about Australia before you came here? I knew there was a place called Australia. I knew about the Olympic Games, kangaroos, koalas, the Opera House and Ayer's Rock.

How else is Australia different from Japan? The food is bigger and cheaper. There are flies. Things are cheaper. In Japan the schools are very strict. In Australia the schools are freer. There is no talking in Japan, no food in class, no drinking. The teacher hits you if you break the rules. Strict uniform must be worn. The work is harder and there are end of term exams. I must do an end of term exam when I get home.

Is there anything in Australia that seems strange? No not really. Australia is the same as Japan in lots of ways. There is much more space in Australia. I don't like it. In Australia people blow their noses with hankies. In Japan we use tissues and throw them away. We blow our nose in private. Pointing is rude in Japan. In Japan you eat noodles with noise, in Australia you don't make noise.

Have you played any Australian sports? I didn't know about cricket in Japan. I played cricket once but it is boring. It takes all day.

Where have you travelled since you arrived in Australia? I went to Melbourne for orientation and toured the city and saw the beach. I went to Sydney during the last holidays. I went to Madame Toussoudes, Darling Harbour, the Opera House. I have been to Orange and Sofala. On the 17th November I will go to Central Australia for 10 days with the other Japanese exchange students. I am looking forward to that.







Year 11 had partaken of a lecture and viewing of the Jeffrey Smart exhibition, plus a visit to the Powerhouse Museum for a design exhibition.




ROCK EISTEDDFOD

The Kelso Bus Club

The club has a varied round of activities. A range of talks and quizs on subjects such as: "Spot the bus," "the Omnibus Act of 1963," "Buses around the World"



and the much loved favourite James Black's "Engine Sounds of Sydney" are regular club activities. We try to mix a bit of theory with practical aspects of busing.

Many members have collections of bus parts and paraphernalia. There are uniforms and tickets, and all sorts of things. "I like tyres. I've got a collection of 73 tread rubbings. Computing **Studies**

Computing Studies has continued to grow as a subject at Kelso High School. Year 7 programs have been developed to build on the varied experiences of the students in primary school. An introduction to the Internet has been met with considerable enthusiasm. Many students have now established their own e-mail address.

Years 9 and 10 programs have followed a semester format. Following on from last year, a course in Web Page construction was met with great interest by the students. Students excelled with this unit and were able to make their work more visually interesting through the use of scanned photographs and the digital camera.

1998 Higher School Certificate results were very pleasing with all three courses achieving results well above the state average. New courses will be introduced into Year 11 in 2000 and staff have undertaken professional development for these. The computing staff have also been involved in writing the new syllabus.

A small number of students participated in the Australian Computer Competition with some very pleasing results. Two students achieved Distinctions and four students were awarded Credits.

A number of Year 10 students have participated in group work with students from Raglan Public School. They have acted as tutors to the Primary students who have developed their school Web Page and have acquired the skills to maintain their page in the coming years.

It is hoped to be able to introduce students to a broader range of technologies in 2000 and implement the new Year 11 syllabuses. A link has been established with a Welsh high school and it is hoped to work on some collaborative projects in 2000.



School Counsellor

Kelso High School has two school counsellors who visit the school every day except Thursday. Mrs Louise Curtis and Mrs Robyn McGill are both experienced teachers and registered psychologists. They work in a number of schools with children from Preschool to Year 12. They talk with students, parents, teachers and members of the wider community to ensure that young people get the best out of their schooling.

School counsellors can be involved in many things. It can range from the assessment of student needs using a range of educational and psychological tests, to working with groups of students on issues such as becoming more assertive or expressing their needs more effectively. They are involved in working with Learning Support Teams catering for students with particular needs. They work to assist individual students to make positive choices. They refer to and consult with other agencies involved in helping our students.

One of the main activities in the secondary school is counselling. Students may refer themselves to discuss an issue in confidence, or they can be referred by teachers, parents or other interested people. All you have to do is see the counsellor or leave a message at the main office.

Kelso Environment Centre

This year a real highlight of the Centre's activity has been our participation in competitions and other activities outside the school.

The first state-wide Envirothon competition was held this year involving year 11 students; Michael Hatherly, Amber Pescud, Ben Pitcher and Ryan Woodland. The competition involved students preparing Environmental Impact Statements on proposed developments and presenting their results to an audience and panel of judges. The first round of the competition was held at Dubbo Zoo where the team tested the water, soil, flora and fauna of an area to determine the impact of building a motel on the site. Our team won the round and proceeded to the final in Sydney.

The Envirothon final was very exciting! Eating prawns, sleeping in the Quarantine station on Sydney Harbour and touring around Goat Island was an amazing experience for everyone involved. The team examined convict and Aboriginal sites and a water rat colony to develop strategies to help the National Parks and Wildlife Service preserve Goat Island. Not only did the students get to tour through the set of the Water Rats TV show, they also won the competition (and \$250 worth of prizes each!). The competition will run again next year so get ready year 11!

The year eight science extension class came to grips with "Murder Under the Microscope". This competition involves researching a list of crime sites

(catchments), victims (plant and animal species) and villains (environmental treats). The researchers monitored the Murder Headquarters on the 'net, and worked to narrow down the lists as clues were released. By the time the satellite link up began on the final day, they were confident they had the site and victim, and soon thought they'd spotted the villain too, so made an early accusation – but a last minute clue proved our undoing. Refusing to be discouraged, the group went on to prepare a management plan to address the problem, and this won us a prize in the Eco-planners section, an excellent result! Congratulations to everyone, especially Karen Mortimore and Susan Scott, who raced to complete our submission as the deadline loomed ever closer.

In Term III, we hosted a group of senior educators from Bangladesh. They were particularly interested in the way our environmental education programs, especially StreamWatch, contribute to community education about water quality issues. After meeting Kelso staff in the morning, the group went to the river to check macros under the guidance of our students.

The Thursday afternoon StreamWatch groups worked as peer tutors with Kelso, Raglan and South Bathurst Primary Schools, leading them through the fieldwork for BugWatch. They found being "teacher" an interesting challenge, and their help was much appreciated. BugWatch is a twice-yearly survey of water life, which contributes to monitoring the health of our waterways across the state.

Owen Sutton has been monitoring the redevelopment of the Boona wetlands. Early in the year, the yabbies finally undermined the bank beyond repair, and for a while we had Boona drylands; then, with a truckload of clay and some creative bobcat work, the pond was restored, deeper, broader and altogether better than before. The heavy rains and warmer temperatures have brought an explosion of pond life; frogs are

Where did you get the inspiration for 'Metro 5'?I really wanted the gold passes. I was desperate. I racked my brain and in a flash the word 'Metro' just came to me. The cinema gave me a job as well. It's a good job and I meet lots of people.

How did you get involved in the Environment Centre? Back in Year 8 with Mrs Goble's science class. She tried to get everyone involved in Streamwatch. I hadn't heard of it before. We did river tests.;monitoring water quality in the Macquarie River. A car load of us would go down to the river and measure the flow, and the temperature. We counted the bugs in the water. We worked out what kind of bugs they were from a chart. We did chemical tests for nutrients like phosphates and nitrates. They make algae and plants grow in the river. Too much algae is a bad thing. We checked dissolved oxygen for the fish and all the other animals. If there isn't enough they can't breathe. It's like going into a sauna for them. Their gills burn from lack of oxygen. So I'm told. It took about 20 to 30 minutes to do. We did it once a fortnight.

What is pollution like in the Macquarie river? It's not that bad. It's not perfect. There is not enough water released from the dam and there are a lot of market gardens around the river that wash fertilisers and pesticides into the river. You wouldn't want to know what is on your lettuce when you eat it. Wash the vegies before you eat them.

How did the Environment Centre come into being? Back in Year 9, 1996, Mrs Goble applied to set up a special environment centre. The government gave a grant and Wal and Adrian spent their holidays making it look nice.

What else does the Environment Centre do? It still does Streamwatch. They have a bus load of students these days. The Environmental Management elective and a Year 7 Streamwatch course are projects they run now. I never did them. I did Streamwatch in Year 9 and 10. I helped with the Wetland project at school. We visited other schools like Blayney and Oberon to learn what they've been doing.

What have you done with Streamwatch.? I went to Malaysia in 1996 to present Streamwatch to Malaysian schools. We went for two weeks. We went to a conference for two days. We gave a six hour presentation. We spent a few days in the Taman Negara National Park. It was great. We got to see a lot of pollution. The boats don't float on water. 



rest of the students were coming to school we headed off to Kanangra Boyd National Park.

When we got to Gillespies lookout (766,384(grid reference)) the nine students and two teachers split up into two groups. With out maps and compasses in check we set off on a slow, downhill slope for about 1.5 km. We followed a path part of the way and then followed our compasses when we lost the path. This path took around twenty minutes and ended up at Box Creek Falls (769,398) where we had a short break at the bottom of the falls.

After deciding against going along the creek, we headed across in a westerly direction over loose rocks, unstable ground with unreliable tree holds and thick scrub until we came to a small creek which trickled down to Box Creek. The group then continued to follow the creek, jumping to either side when it got too narrow at approximately (761,398), we then decided to turn towards Boss Peak.



This part of the journey took a considerable amount of effort on everyone's behalf. The distance was only 600 metres but seemed like more, especially with our heavy backpacks. We continued up a steep hill in a southerly direction for about 35 minutes. The leaders had a rest while the rest of the group followed, we had lunch when both groups joined together at the top of Boss Peak.

After our lunch break, we walked along a marked path for about 1.5 km in a westerly direction. The terrain was down, up down (in order) eventually declining to the Kowmung River (759394) where we set up our tents for the night.

After setting up the tents, the brave people went for a swim in the swimming hole. During this time most of the boys thought they were great dam builders and attempted to make a spa. After a while of throwing rocks in the same place with no effect they game up. When the fire was burning and the swimmers had changed, we sat down around the fire and had dinner. Following this we played a few games of spotlight, truth or dare, watched the stars and bats and witnessed a few minor fires being set alight, then it was time for bed.

Panorama 1999 After a very long, painful and cold nights sleep I took the first opportunity of sunlight to get up. Soon after, Arna joined me. In less than an hour everyone was up. had breakfast and began pulling down tents and trying to squash them back into backpacks.

When the group came together again on the bank of the river, we all took our shoes and socks off and slowly walked through the narrowest bit of the river onto the opposite bank. Shoes back on, we climbed up the hill in single file to Tuglow Caves. In my opinion this was the hardest part of the bushwalking. Blackberry bushes attacking you at every chance, unstable ground which was sliding away from underneath you when you thought you had a good grasp and boulders to climb over. With help from each other we made it to Tuglow Caves after only a few minor scratches and bruises.

After a short break the group split into two, the second group following five to ten minutes after the first on the same track. This 2 km bush walk was easy going and had a great view of the river and surrounding hills in one particular section. We had great team work when one endeavorist had a fall whilst going down a steep hill with loose dirt, this fall resulted in a slightly sprained ankle. After this we travelled a bit slower and each carried some extra items. We made it down to the Kowmung River where we met up with the first group and had our lunch.

The last 3 km were mostly all uphill on a four wheel drive track. We were getting slower as our packs were getting heavier and the sun was getting hotter. We eventually got to our destination approximately 15 minutes away from where we left the bus. Two very fit people, Mr Novak and Paul Mouthaan ran the rest of the way, while the rest of us sat around resting, waiting to be picked up.

The bus trip out of the National Park was just as bumpy as the one coming in but we made it out in one piece. We had one short stop at Oberon where we all got well deserved paddle pops before travelling back to school.

I would like to thank both Mr Novak and Miss Geldard for this opportunity to participate in this great program and for putting up with us for four days and two nights (total including practice). I have gained valuable skills in bushwalking, camping, navigation and team work, not to mention determination.

Outdoor Education

The basis of this program in the school has been the Year 9/10 School Certificate course. This course provides the 15 students with opportunities to develop their skills and knowledge in 'bush based' activities. In doing so students are expected to gain an appreciation for sound use of the environment.

Over the two year course students study elements of: environmental awareness, navigation, abseiling, uses of ropes and knots, planning and organising an expedition, National Parks, camperaft, ecotourism, first aid and dealing with emergency situations. Excursions and field trips are conducted to augment the material studied in the classroom.

This year's excursions were held at Evan's Crown for abseiling; the Bridle Track and Macquarie River as well as Box Creek area in the Kanangra-Boyd National Park for navigation. A visit to an indoor climbing centre in Sydney called" The Pitch" further developed students' climbing skills learnt on the school's climbing wall.

A 3 day camp at Tea Gardens gave students' opportunities to undertake activities such as canoeing and high ropes. Overnight camps in the Kanangra-Boyd area for Year 10 and Dunn's Swamp in the Wollemi National Park for Year 9, put students to the test camping out and developing the various camperaft skills.

We look forward to making further improvements to the course in 2000 as the new Year 9 class start.



Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme

There are currently 22 students registered in the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme. During 1999 eight students gained their Bronze Award. The school now has 12 students undertaking the second level, the silver award.

To satisfy the requirements for each level students must undertake to complete a minimum number of hours in areas of community service, sport and hobby or personal interest. As well, students undertake a practice and final expedition. The expedition is organised and run by the school. At the Bronze level the expedition involves two days away, six hours of each day must be spent bushwalking. The expedition must have an overnight and outdoor camp. At the Silver level the expedition is for three days with two nights of camping.

The camps are usually held in the Blue Mountains/ Kanangra Boyd National Parks and they are great fun.







INDUSTRIAL ARTS

The Industrial Arts Faculty has continued to build on the strengths built up over past years. In Year 7 and 8 Design and Technology there has been work completed on program refinements and catering for different learning styles. Year 10 has worked towards a narrower range of major projects which has place increased emphasis on desired skills and outcomes. This has been a successful change on past approaches. Students in Year 10 will also receive a competency report as a supplement to their school report which more comprehensively reports the abilities of individual students.

Higher School Certificate marking for Industrial Technology was completed in September with some very pleasing projects presented. At the same time Industry Studies: Metal students displayed a high level of skill when they undertook their HSC practical exam. At the end of time these students undertook their Work Placement for one week in a variety of metal based industries in the local and metropolitan areas.

Two staff members undertook Occupational Health and Safety Training in May which led to a faculty safety audit. Many of the issues have been resolved while others are being worked on .OH&S will continue to be given a high profile in the faculty.

Three staff members have undertaken initial Professional Development to assist in the implementation of the new Higher School Certificate courses, Year 11, 2000. All courses have undergone

changes in content and structure but most have maintained similar themes that have proven successful in the past.

An Enrichment Day is organised for mid-November for students from Years 9 to 11 with a particular interest in Auto CAD computer drafting. An outreach tutor will provide expert tuition in this. Students considering tertiary studies in Engineering or Architecture, entering the trades, or undertaking senior Industrial Arts curses will benefit greatly from the day.

A significant tool replacement program has been undertaken in 1999. This has seen many of the power tools replaced and the variety increased together with the additions of a new spot welder and a Mig welder. Five additional computers have been installed which are being particularly used for Technical Drawing, written presentations and research on the Internet.

1998 Higher School Certificate results were very pleasing. Each of the subjects of Engineering Science, Industrial Technology and Industry Studies saw the candidature achieve at or above the state average.

The year 2000 will see the continuation and cosolidation of programs in the junior school and the implementation of the new syllabuses in Year 11.

Mathematics

During 1999, the Mathematics faculty has been participating in a pilot program called "Counting On" which focuses on improving basic numeracy skills in the junior school. Throughout the first two terms we were able to work closely with Charles Sturt University, Mitchell to provide some intensive work on developing specific skills. This was then supported in the second half of the year by using additional support teachers to either team teach or work with small groups as the need arose. In this regard both Mrs Hummelshoj and Mrs Mouthaan have been a tremendous help to the classroom teacher and I am sure that students have benefited from the experience. The first year of this "Counting On" program has also been an information gathering exercise with the view to changing our teaching and learning programs to better meet the needs of our students.

Much of this year has also been devoted to our preparation for the changes to the Higher School Certificate. In Mathematics students now have the choice between studying a Calculus based course or a non Calculus based course. The majority of our students well choose the non Calculus course to be called General Mathematics. This is a completely new course and

replaces Maths In Society and Maths In Practice. It is designed to challenge the ability of most students and promotes the use of technology in a Mathematical context. Students may be required to use spreadsheets and graphical calculators to solve problems of a practical nature on topics such as Finance, Data Analysis, Measurement, and Algebraic Modelling.

Those students still wishing to study Calculus are still provided for with the old 2 Unit course now simply being called Mathematics and the old 3 Unit course being called Mathematics Extension 1. The content of both courses has not changed at this stage.



Last year's Higher School Certificate results were very pleasing. All courses finished with a mean above the state average, reflecting the hard work of students and staff alike. 3 Unit had a school average of 84.6 compared to the state average of 82.78. In 2 Unit, our students finished with an average of 68.9 compared to 65.55 across the state. As well, 24% of the class finished in the top 10% of the state and no student finished in the bottom 30%.



Maths in Society was also impressive with an average of 62.25 being nearly four points above the state average with 17% of students finishing in the top 10% of the state, and 14% in the next 10%. Our average in Maths in Practice was 60.27, nearly three points above the average for the course. 24% of students finished in the top 20% of the state and no student finished in the bottom 20%.

In conclusion I would like to thank the staff for their untiring efforts and I wish students, particularly Year 12, all the best in their end of year exams.



Year 11 Legal Studies students had the opportunity to be involved in the Mock Trial, Schools in Parliament and the NSW Student Constitutional Convention.


Year 12 also had a lecture afternoon with Mark Worthington, a local solicitor on housing issues.



Highlights in HSIE


Year 7 Geography Excursion In July and November, Year 7 students who were studying Geography travelled to Blackheath to walk from Neates Glen to Evan's Lookout. This bush walk gave the students the chance to see vegetation typical of a temperate rainforest at first hand which was an element of their Geography course they were studying in class. The students also answered questions on the geological history of the area and landform features which included sandstone cliffs and overhangs as well as canyons, waterfalls and gorges. The students thoroughly enjoyed the 7 km bush walk but there were a few sore muscles the next day, which symbolised the forces of nature cutting such a deep canyon which they had to climb into and out of on the day.

Year 9 Geography has had a busy year with studies in world ecosystems. The class completed a large coral reef mural with all students contributing fish, coral, turtles, etc to the large wall display! Eight students also attended a combined excursion with Environmental Management to Western Plains Zoo to study endangered species and the zoo's wetlands.

The class also combined with the Environmental class for a variety of Streamwatch activities and a visit to the waterworks and sewage treatment plant. The group also completed a study of Jordan's Creek as a part of their studies of catchment management as well as looking at the management plan for Ben Chifley Dam.

Year 10 also completed the Grand Canyon bush walk where they studied the geological history and vegetation on the walk.

1999 saw the return of **Senior Geography** to Kelso High School and students undertook fieldwork involving Jordan Creek, Macquarie River, the sewage treatment works and water plant. They also attended excursions to examine soil profiles, weathering and erosional processes in rivers.
